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# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE POSTS AND TELECOMMUNICATIONS 

## DEPARTMWNT 1962.

I have the honour to sumbit the Arnual Feport of the Posts and Teleoomunioations Department for the rinancial year ending Desamber 1962. The Report of the Post Office Savings Bank in respect of the same period has been submitted separately. Tablos of statistics in reapect of the various services for which the Department is respenaiblo are annexed in the form of appendioes to this Report.

## 1. GRNERAL:

The difyzoulties of administration of tho Dopartment experienoed in 2961 on account of a shortage of staff continued timpoughout 1962. The position was further ageravsted because cf long del2ys experienced in the filling of wost of the vaoanaies which occurred during 1962.

Reconditioning of some postal buildings was adversely affeoted on acoount of the financial position which existed in the country after the February disturbances. An automatic Telephone Exchange was also opened at Weles, West Bark Demerara in the course of 1962.

Following the tragic death by violence of the acting Postmaster of the Tuschen Post Office which precipitated a one week strike by members of the British Guiana Post Office Torkers' Union, a Postal Security Frobe Committee was appointed by Government. The Conmittoe's Chairman was the Commissioner of Folice and the other members consistad of the Accountant General, the President of the British Guiana Postmastera' Union, an architect of the kinistry of Works and Hydraulics and myself with a Controller of Posts as Seoretary. The Preaident of the British Guiana Post Office Workers' Union declined an invitation to serve as a member but he nevertheless participated in all the deliberations of the Committee. The recommendations of the Committee included the provision of burglar alarms and additional telephone points in Post Offices; special safes and structural alterations to the Post Offices and the Postmasters' quarters with a view to providing the maximum possible security.

Additional telephone kiosks totalling nine (9) were orected in Georgetorn. On the postal side ner applications were received for private letter boxes in Georgetom and in New Ansterdam. To cope with expeoted increases in the demand for this servioe both in New Amsterdarm and at Mackenzie provision is being made for the new Post Offices which are being planned for those areas to have adequate aocomodation for the construction of Private Letter Boxes.

The Pomeroon Mail Service was extended to the St. Monica Mission with effect from August 2, 1962, Niss Beatrice Duke was awarded the contract for the Mail Service in the Upper and Lower Pomeroon River for a period of 3 years with effect from lst August, 1962.

The financial results of the year's working were fairly encouraging. Taking into account cash revenue and the value of free services rendered to other Government Departments the postal revenue increased from $1,566,655$ in 1961 to $1,674,059$ in 1962 or $6.1 \%$, and the Telocommunications revenue from : $1,523,906$ in 1961 to

(a) Revenue and Expenditure:

The cash Torking deficit of the Posts and Teleoommunications Department in lyCi amounted to 443.582 ( $£ 92,412$. 18s. 4d) as compared
 taken for the estimated value of "rree Services", consisting of franked postal packets, telcgrans, official Money Orders, free and half rate telephone rentals, f'ree telephone calls, electrical inspections and installations and revenue collected for and on behalf of other Geverment Departments amounting to $\% 887,919$ ( $£ 184,983.2 \mathrm{~s} .6 \mathrm{~d})$ there is 2 surplus of $\% 444,337$ ( $£ 92,570.4 \mathrm{~s} .2 \mathrm{2d}$ ).

The Postal Branch showed a cash deficit of $\% 509,432$ ( $£ 106,131.13 s .4 \mathrm{~d}$ ) but when credit is taken for free services amounting to $\$ 392,389$ ( $£ 81,74714 \mathrm{~s}$. 2d) the deficit is reduced to $\$ 11 \%, 043$ (£ 24,383. 19s. 2d). The cash deficit in 1961 was \$718,715
(£ 149,732. 5s. 10d).
(c) Telecommunications Branch:

The Telecommunications Eranch showed a oash surplus of $\$ 65,850$ ( $\Omega 13,718$. $15 \mathrm{~s} . \mathrm{Od}$ ) and when the sum of $\$ 495,530$ ( $203,235.8 \mathrm{~s} .4 \mathrm{~d}$ ) for "free services" is taken into account there is a total surplus of \$561,300 (£l16,954. 3s.4d). There was a cash deficit of \$110,066 (£22,930. 8s. 4d) in 1961.
5. MONEY AND POSTAL ORDERS - APPENDICES II AND III:

## (a) Money Orders:

Money Orders (Inland and Overseas to the value of $\$ 5,846,520$. ( $£, 218,025$. Os.Od.) were issued and $7,358,317$ ( $£ 1,532,982.14 \mathrm{~s} .2 \mathrm{~d}$ ) paid in 1962 representing a decrease or 4529,295 ( $£ 110,269$. 15s. 10d) on the value of orders issued in 1961 and a decrease of 221,204 ( $£ 46,084.3 \mathrm{~s} .4 \mathrm{~d}$ ) on the value of orders paid in 1961. The total commission accruing to the Department for the Money Order Service amounted to $\$ 63,264$ ( $£ 13,180$. Os.Od.) made up as under:

## (b) British Postal Orders:

British Postal Orders issued by Post Offices throughout the Colony in 1962 numbered 81,465 valued at $425,169.60(£ 88,577)$ as against 71,057 valued at $\$ 443,333(£ 92,361$ ) issued in the previous year. The number of orders cashed mas 128, 252 valued at $\$ 1,372,531.20$ ( $£ 285,944$ ) as compared with 114,827 velued at $1,197,014$ ( $£ 249,378$ ) in 1961.

Revenue to the valuc of $4,990(: 3,039,27 \mathrm{sos} 8 \mathrm{~d})$ accrued to the Department as commission collected for the service.

## (c) Inland Postal Ordurs:

Inland Postal Oraers issucd during 1962 numbered 130,942 valuod at $\$ 693,452$ ( $£ 144,469.3$ s.4d) ns compered with 145,125 valued $\$ 305,222$ ( $£ 167,754,11 \mathrm{~s} .8 \mathrm{~d}$ ) in 1961. Oriers paid numbered 131,691 valued © 755,576 ( $2157,411.133 .4 \mathrm{a}$ ) as áci-inst 143,729 valued at $\$ 812,747$ (£ 169,322. 5s. 10d) is 1961.

Revenue to the valuo of $20,280(\therefore 4,225, ~ O s$. Od) was colleoted as commission from the sale of Inland Postal Orders.

## 6. CHSH AND ACCOUNTING RESPONSIBIITY OF THE DEP:RTMETT.

Cash and Accounting responsibility of the Department amounted to $\$ 95,210,720$. ( $£ 19,835,566$. 13 s .4 d ) in 1962 as compared with ( £ $17,210,182.18 s .4 \mathrm{~d}$ ) in the previous year.

## 7. MAIL SERVICES - APPRANDIX IV:

(a) Inland Surfaca Mail:

The services of the Transport and Herbours Department, continued to be used as the main conveyance of surface mail, and in areas where these services were not available conveyance itas affected by motor transport operated by the Department ar by private contraotors.

## (b) Inland Air Mail:

Nir Mail services to the Rupununi, Mazaruni, North West District, Bartica and Mackenzie Districts wero operated as usual by British Guiana (Government) Lirways Limited.
(c) Overseas Suriace Nail:

During 196215,525 bags of surfece mail were received by

241 vessels as against 15,226 bags received by 250 vessels in 1961. Despatches totalled l, 888 bags by 90 vessels as against l, 894 bags by 85 waisels in 1961.

Mails were received from the United Kingdom direct by vessels of the Booker, Royel Dutch, Harrison and Saguenay lines and also vis Trinidad and $\# e r e ~ d e s p a t c h e d ~ t o ~ t h e ~ U n i t e d ~ K i n g d o m ~ b y ~ t h e ~ B o o k e r ~ a n d ~$ Royal Dutch Lines which operate regular services.

The United States of imerica continued to be served mainly by vessels of the Royel Dutch Line and Canada by vessels of the Saguenay, Lamport and Holt Lines. The West Indies were served via Triniciad by vessels of the Bookers Coestal Shipping which operate a weekly service. Schonners, when available, were also used for this service.
(d) Overseas Air Mail:

The Overseas Air Mail Services were maintained in the year under review by the following four Airlino Companies:

British West Indian Sirways Limited,<br>Pan imerican World sirweys,<br>Royal Dutch iirlines; and sir France.

dir Mail traffic continued to increase both outward and inward, 11,325,050 packets being handled in 1962 as against 9,009,505 in 1961 representing an increase of $25.6 \%$.

## 8. PLRCEL POST - PPPENDIX V:

(a) General:

The total number of parcels handled in 1962 was 169,602 as ocmpared with 171,921 in 1961. Particulars of these parcels are show in sppendix $V(a)$ and it will be observod that thore mere variations in all categories of parcels, and a total decrease of 2,319 parcels as compared with 1961.
(b) Cveiseas Surface Parcel liail:

During 1962, the number of parcels receivod and despatohed by surface mail totalled 90,169 an increase of 2,621 over tho previous year.

## (c) Overseas diir Parcel Mail:

Incoming and outgoing air percel mails varied during 1962. Parcel: received totalled 10,065 en incrocse of 189 over 1961 and those despatched totalled 5,454 a decrease of 393 from the previous year.
(d) Customs Revenue:

The amount collected for Customs Dues on incoming parcels and packets during the year amounted to 60,623 ( $\approx 12,629.15 \mathrm{~s}$. . Od) as against \$66,223 (£ 13,798. 10s. 10d).

## (e) Postage Rates:

There was ro increase in postage rates or parcels in 1962.

## 9. POSTIGE IND REVENUE STLMPS : ND STIMIONERY - IPPBMDIX VI:

Revenue from the salu of Postage Stamps and Franking Machinos amountod to $\$ 1,150,895(. \varepsilon, 239,769.15 s .10 d)$ as against $\$ 1,033,612$ (£ 215,127. 10s. Od).

Stamp sales through Neopost Machines amounted to $;$ ( $£ 30,257.10$ s.0d) as compared with $\$ 155,140(£ 32,320.16 \mathrm{~s} .8 \mathrm{~d})$ in 1961.

## 10. RRDIO LICENCES - APPENDIX IX:

The number of radio licences issued during the year was 43,792 valued $\$ 65,688$ ( $£ 3,685.0 \mathrm{~s} .0 \mathrm{a}$ ) as a ant 42,237 valued $\$ 63,356$ ( $23,199.3 \mathrm{s.4d}$ ) in 1961.

TELECOMMUNICATIONS.

11. STAFF:

The Telecommunications Branch with an establishment of 265 officers was under the direct control of an Engineer-in-Chief while the Electrical Inspectors' Section which is also supervised by the Engineer-in-Chief carried a staff of 47. These figures are exclusive of a permanent force of casual employees which numbered 106 in 1962.

## 12. Telephones - Appendix VII:

There were 9,155 telephones in use as compared with 9,066 in 1961. The number of effective trunk calls amounted to 745,200 as against 447,426 in the previous year. Of these 432,216 were paid calls while 312,984 were official free calls made by Government. There were 257 Sub Exchanges, Call Offices and Private Axchenges in operation as compared with 205 in 1961.

## 13. Telegraphs:

The total number of landline telegraph offices in the coastal area and radiotelegraph stations in the interior is 43. The number of telegrams transmitted over these stations amounted to 155,180 to the value of $\$ 94,463.58$ in 1962 as against 170,687 to the value of $\$ 107,601$ in 1961 .

## 14: Radio Telephone Services:

In addition to the radio-tolegraph services referred to under Telegraphs, radio-telephone services were maintained with interior stations and coastaleships.

There are 7 stations operated by Post Office Telecommunications (these stations are elso-radio-telegraph stations) 10 by other Government Departments, 37 by private enterprise, (timber, mining and ranching interests) and 12 coastal ships and launches, all of which communicate via Post Office Telecommunications Central Radio Station in Georgetown.

## 15: Other Radio Services:

(a) Brondenstine: The British Guiana United Broadcasting Company Limited continued to operate this service.
(b) ^aeronautical: These services at Atkinson Field were operated and maintained by International Aeradio (Caribbean) Limited. British Guiana Airways (Government) operated and maintained a number of stations in connection with their flight operations in the Colony.
(c) Maritime Radio Beacon: The radio beacon transmitter was meintained and operated at the Georgetown Station by Post Office Telecommunications for the Transport and Harbours Department.
(d) Aeronautical Radio Beacon: in Aoronautical Radio Beacon res maintained and operated at Lethem on behalf of the Civil Aviation Department.
(e) Police Radio Communications were maintained by the Police Departinent.

Overseas Radio Services and Services with Ships: Messirs. Cable and Wireless (West Indies Limited, continued to maintain and operate the overseas radio talephone service in association with the Post Office Tele phone Service and also radio communications with ship at sea.

Rehabilitation of the Tele communications Services:
(2) Gecrestown: Demand for telephone service continued Enituanat 155?. Unfortunately this demand could not be satisiliod due to the lack of facilities in the exchange, Consideration was piven to the provision of the nocesisary additional plant to cater for more subswideata.
(b) Ifral Areas: The demond for telephone service in the rura alsás continued to exceed anticipation. Work contimued on the reconstruction of the overhead line route between Wales and Vreed-en-Hoop but similar wo C k on the East Panir. Demerara had to be suspended due to the lack of funds.

The Electrical Inspectors' Branch of the Post Office Tele communi cations continued to carry out its functions of inspecting and testing electrical installations in all types of buildings to ensure the safety of the public. It also maintained all electrical installations, apparatus and appliances in Government buildings and operated Government Lighting plants in rural areas.

The total number of inspections made during the year was 8,265 . This increased number of inspections, compared with 7,221 in 1961, is due to the prospect of suprlies of electricity being made available in the rural areas.

## 18. <br> CON CLUSTION:

Despite the unfortunate set-backs experienced in 1962, due partly to the lack of adequate and trained staff, to the February disturbances and to the strike of members of the British Guiana Post Office Workers! Union progress continued to be made in the work of the Department. This was due larpely to the sense of reoponsibility, devation to duty and Ioyalty of most of the staff. I wish to take this opportunity of expressing thanks to them and of pl cing on record my appreciation of the valuable service renciered by them.

On the Telecommunications side, I can only repeat what was stated in the previous $r$ port viz. that the extension of the Goergetown Exchange and of some rural exchanges will soon be necessary. This will involve consideration of the question of providing better transport facilities than exist at present, also housing facilities for district maintenance staff following the commissionjing of new Fural Exchanges.
