Mr. Phang on behalf of Mr. Lee gave notice of th following questions:-

- Is it the case that as alleged there is misappropriation and/or embezzlement of money at the Rice Marketing Board?
- 2. If the answer is in the negative, will Government take steps to investigate the matter by putting it in the hands of the Police Department?
- 3. If the answer is in the affirmative, will Government cause the Audit Department to immediately carry out the audit of the Rice Marketing Board's Books for the last three years?

COLONIAL SECRETARY - RETURN FROM LEAVE

Mr. Wight on behalf of Members extended a cordial welcome to the Colonial Secre ary on his return from leave. Mr. Gutch thanked Members.

MARGARINE - CESSATION OF IMPORTS

Mr. Fernandes in referring to the reply by the Acting Colonial Secretary the previous day on the question of the suspension of import licences for Margarine and Compound Lard stated that Import Licen es in respect of edible oil were rejected by the Controller of Supplies and Prices since the 8th of July. He added that the shortage of edible oil was serious and urged that early action should be taken in the matter.

His Excellency assured Mr. Fernandes that the matter would be looked into; and added that it was regrettable that seasonal shortages of local commodities should occur and that he had already directed that all precaution should be taken to avoid any such recurrence.

* MR. FERNANDES' MOTION RECOMMENDING INTRODUCTION OF AN EDUCATIONAL TAX

- (b) that if it is found necessary, a special educational tax be imposed to cover any increase cost in connection with Primary Education.

MR. LUCKHOO'S MOTION REGARDING THE GOVERNMENT OF SOUTH AFRICA'S APARTHEID POLICY

Mr. Luckhoo was speaking to the following motion when the hour of adjournment was reached: -

BE IT RESOLVED that this Council condemns the policy of racial segregation enforced by the South African Government and places on record its abhorrence of the attitude adopted to the various races in the pursuit of this olicy which is likely to affect adversely the amicable relations existing amongst the peoples of this Colony and of other mixed communities;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Council respectfully prays His *xcellency the Governor to transmit a copy of this Resolution to the Secretary of State for the Colonies and to the United Nations urging that steps be taken by the United Nations to persuade the South African Government to desist from such a disastrous course and to adopt a policy towards all races in South Africa in keeping with the Declaration of Human Rights.
