CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES

The Minutes of the Meeting held on Friday, the 25th of July, 1952, as printed and creulated, were taken as read and confirmed.

GOVERNMENT HOTICES

The Attorney General gave of the intention at a later stage to move the suspension of the relevant Standing Rules and Orders to ena le him to take the Gambling Prevention (Amendment) Bill, 1952, through all stages.

X UNOFFICIAL NOTICES

Dr. Jagan gave notice of the following motion:-

WHEREAS in British Gu'ana there are a multiplicity of trade unions and in recent years an increase in the incidence of jurisdictional disputes among trade unions:

AND WHEREAS in the U.S.A. to avoid jurisdictional disputes and the growth of company unions, the National Labour Relations Board (N.L.R.B.) conducts a poll, and awards the union with ajority membership sole powers for purposes of col ective bargaining with the employers;

AND WHEREAS the Gover ments of Canada and Jamaica have adopted labou -relations machinery similar to that of the U.S.A.:

BE IT RESOLVED that this Council recommends to Government the enactment of legislation setting up labour relations machinery for the determination and award in cases of jurisdictional disputes to unions with majority membership sole jurisdiction for purposes of collective bargaining.

NOTICE OF QUESTIONS

Dr. Jagan gave notice of the following questions:-

- 1. In view of answer 1 that were the Corentyne Road widened to 22 ft., "then it would have been necessary to wait several years until the widened portion of the embankment had had sufficient time to consolidate", will Government say how it has been possible to construct the road over new deviations within one year? Is it a fact that the Resident Engineer was sent to the U.K. and the U.S.A. to secure adequate equipment to do such a job, that such equipment have been purchased, and that one Sheeps-foot roller and a pneumatic type roller are now lying unused at Canje?
- 2. In view of Government's peply in answer 2, that the original specifications were not (a) a stone filled base course of 4" thickness (b) a 3" to 4" wearing carpet, thereby giving an asphalt of approximately 7" to 8", will Government state whether this type of co struction was carried out at parts of the Sheet A chor Road 200-300 ft. to Milestone No. 2?
- 3. In view of answer 3 (a) what is responsible for the cracking of the Corentyne Road, and how long does it take for volatile oils to be dispersed and for traffic to reduce percentages of voids? Is it a fact that 3" chips put in as an armour course are now disappearing in the sand-bitumen, and cartwheel markings are still appearing? Is Government aware that if the estimate of \$1.93 per sq. yd. as stated i answer 3(B) is correct, then the estimated cost for the construction of the Corentyne Road will be exceeded despite the wide publicity that savings amounting to \$100,000 will be effected?
- 4. In view of Answer 4 and now that 30 miles of road have been constructed w 11 Government state the following -
 - (a) The distances whe e the 9" thickness was not considered ne essary.
 - (b) The distances whe e the 9" thickness was considered necessary and sufficient to distribute the loads safely over the sub-base.

 The distances where greater than 9" thickness was found to be necessary.

- 5. In view of the cost at \$\pi\$.26 per sq.yd. as against \$1.93 at Canje, why has this sytem of construction not been implemented for the construction of the Corentyn. Road especially as the \$1\frac{1}{4}^{11}\$ penetration carpet on the East Coast Road has more mech nical strength in relation to sand bitumen?
- 6. In view of the fact that all modern equipment is at the disposal of t. Resident Engineer, is Government satisfied that labour costs are approximately 20% 25% of the total costs of the road?
- 7. In view of answer 9, can Government table a chart of the water tables in the wet anddry seasons?
- 8. In view of answer 11 will Government say whether in the past a monthly so il test statement was attached to the progress reports? If not, does Government consider it advisable that in future monthly soil test statements should be attached to the progress reports, the soil tests showing (1) liquid limits, (2) plastic limits (3) bearing strength, (4) tensile strength (5) sheer strength (6) equilibrium moisture content (7) optimum moisture content.
- 9. Is it a fact that the estimate for the construction of the Lodge Village Road was exceeded by \$13,000, and this excess was met from the Corentyne Road?
- 10. In view of answer 12, that the "Corentyne Road is not an experiment prior to the construction of other future roads" will Government state reasons why experimental boards have been posted at portions of the Core tyne Road?
- 11. In view of answer 13 th t "the Victor Diesel Engine was purchased as a spar unit for the Steam generator on the bituminous mixing plant" will Government state whether it is possible that a diesel engine can repla e a battery ignition gasolene engine when the ignition power is used to ignite sprays of fuel pumped into the boiler? Can a diesel engine sup ly ignition?
- 12. In view of answer 16, will Government give the date when the prices of drums were increased from 24¢ to 40¢ per dr x, and give also the last receipt for drums purchased by the gateman at 24¢?

- Mr. Debidin gave notice of the ollowing questions:-
 - 1. What is the reason for he existing shortage (shortage in the months of July and August, 1952) in the Colony of (a) rice; (b) flour, and (c) edible oil?
 - 2. Who is the person and/or what is the department responsible for checking and ensuring continuous distribution for local consumption of each of the aforesaid commodities?
 - 3. Does the Colony produce more than it consumes in the following commo ities (a) rice, (b) edible oil? What is the difference in quantity between total productio, and total local consumption for each of these commodities in the years 1950, 1951 and 192?
 - 4. What is the total amount of rice exported from the Colony for each of he months January, February, March, April, May, June and July, 1952?
 - 5. What coconut products were exported, giving the quantity of each product, particularly copra and edible oil, in the year 1951, and in each of the months of January to July, 1952, and giving the country of destination in each case?
 - 6. What quantity of rice h s been prepared in cartoms for export, and what quantity to each country has the rice in cartons beer exported?
 - 7. What quantity of rice h s been exported in 1951, and during 1952 outside of the contract requirements of those Colonies to which the Rice Marketing Board has been under contract to supply rice in the above period?
 - 8. What is the quantity exported to each of those non-contract countries (if any), in the aforesaid period?

BE IT RESOLVED that this Council recommends to Government that proposed increased fares and freight charges for railway and stamer services be non-effective until such time sthe Legislative Council has fully discussed the recent "Report of the Committee appointed to consider Ways and Means of Effecting Economies".

As the motion was not second'd, Dr. Jagan asked leave to withdraw the motion.

Leave having been granted, the motion was withdrawn.

✓ GAMBLING PREVENTION (AMENDMENT) BILL, 1952

With Council's consent and on a motion by the Attorney General seconded by the Colonial Secretary the BILL intituled AN ORDINANCE FURTHER TO AMEND THE GAMBLING PREVENTION ORDINANCE, CHAPTER 95, BY EXEMPTING CERTAIN LOTTERIES FROM THE OPERATION OF THE PROVIS ONS THERESERWAS read the second time.

/ BLASTING OPERATIONS AMENDMENT BILL 1962


