A BILL INTITULED

AN ORDINANCE FURTHER TO AMEND THE SUPREME COURT OF JUDICATURE ORDINANCE. A.D. 1953

Enacted by the Legislature of British Guiana.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Supreme Court of Short title. Judicature (Amendment) Ordinance, 1953, and shall be construed and read as one with the Supreme Court of Judicature Ordinance, hereinafter referred to as the Principal Ordinance, and any Ordinance amending the page 10.

2. Section six of the Principal Ordinance as repealed and Amend-replaced by section two of the Supreme Court of Judicature ment of (Amendment) Ordinance, 1936, and amended by section two of section 6 of the Supreme Court of Judicature (Amendment) Ordinance, 1950, pal Ordinance, 1950, p is hereby further amended-

(a) by the substitution for the words "not more than four" of the words "not more than five"; and

(b) by the substitution for the words "the First, Second and Third Puisne Judges" of the words "the First, Second, Third and Fourth Puisne Judges".

Section eight of the Principal Ordinance as amended

from time to time is hereby further amended—

(a) by the substitution in subsection (1) for the words section 8 of "six thousand eight hundred" and the words "thirty-two the Princithousand six hundred and forty" of the words "eight pal Ordinathousand three hundred" and the words "thirty-nine thousand eight hundred and forty" respectively; and

(b) by the insertion in subsection (2) after the words "to

(b) by the insertion in subsection (2) after the words "to the Third Puisne Judge a salary not exceeding fifteen hundred pounds;" of the words "to the Fourth Puisne Judge a salary not exceeding fifteen hundred pounds;".
