I have the honour to submit the Annual Departmental Report on the Deeds Registry and the Supreme Court
Registry for the year 1961. As ex officio Registrar of
the Supreme Court, and ex officio Registrar of the following:
Joint Stock Companies, Trade Marks, Patents and Designs,
Business Names, Life Assurance Companies, Industrial and
Provident Societies and Trade Unions, this Report deals
with those matters also. With the coming into force of
the Land Registry Ordinance on the 1st January, 1960, the
Registrar of Deeds now also functions as Registrar of Lands.

2. The Magistrates are under the control of the Honourable the Chief Justice, but subject to his direction
the administration of the Magistrates' Department is the
responsibility of the Registrar.

### PART II

## DEEDS FEGISTRY - CONVEYALCING

21. The figures for 1961 indicate that there was a falling off in conveyancing business in every department during
the year. A comparative statement of the figures for 1960
and 1961 is as follows:-

The value of properties transported however increased by approximately \$5: million over that for 1960. The total amount secured by mortgages passed in 1961 decreased by \$2½: million while the total value of cancelments decreased by \$3: million from the 1960 figures.

## COMPANIES

23. The Companies Ordinance Chapter 328 of the Laws of British Guiana wasamended by the Companies (Amendment) Ordinance, No. 11 of 1961. This amendment has brought companies! legislation more nearly into line that in the United Kingdom. The inadequacy of trained staff to which reference has been made in previous Reports continues to militate against /the....

the full and proper administration of the Ordinance. The need for United Kingdom training of Officers in this special-ised branch of the law cannot be stressed too much.

- 24. Many companies commit breaches of the law but through lack of staff appropriate action cannot be taken against them.
- 25. The Companies registered in 1961 are listed at Appendix "B".

## LIFE ASSURANCE COMPANIES

- 26. There were 16 life assurance companies on the register on 1st January, 1961.

- 27. On the 1st January, 1961, there were 44 Trade unions on the register. During the year 4 trade unions were registered.
- There has been no apparent improvement in the manner in which the books of accounts of the unions are kept. The Director of Audit has made some very adverse comments in this respect. It is desirable that stricter control of funds should be exercised and that there should be better accounting but as I commented in my last Report the fault is very largely due to the fact that the persons charged with the handling of the funds of unions usually have little of no knowledge of book-keeping. A separate report in pursuance of sections 36 of the Trades Unions Ordinance will be for-warded to the Honourable the Attorney General.
- 29. Particulars relating to trade union business in 1961 appear in Appendix "C".

#### TRADE MARKS

30. Arrangements have been made for one of our Senior Officers to take a course in trade marks practice at the Patents Office in England early next year. This will fill

a great need for officers of sufficient technical training in this branch of the law to deal adequately with the many problems that arise in modern trade marks practice. It is to be hoped that these courses of training will be made available to other officers from time to time as long as the need exists.

#### PATENTS AND DESIGNS

- 32. The miscellaneous Enactments (Amendment) Ordinance No. 29 of 1961 by giving the Registrar the power to appoint suitable persons to examine patent specifications, has removed what has hitherto been an obstacle to the quick despatch of patent business. The fee for examination however still remains fixed at \$25: a sum which is not likely to induce suitable persons to accept appointment as examiners.
- 33. Details of the business transacted in respect of Patents and Designs in 1961 are given at Appendix "E".

#### BUSINESS NAMES

- 34. Notices were sent out in terms of section 12 (1) of the Business Names (Registration) Ordinance 332, requiring persons to furnish particulars of the business carrie on. Unfortunately the Registrar is often not in aposition to prosecute defaulters, as the evidence necessary to secure a conviction is seldom made available to him.
- 35. Appendix "F" given particulars of business names registered for the year 1961.

#### INDUSTRIAL AND PROVIDENT SOCIETIES

- 36. Under the provisions of the Industrial and Provident Societies Ordinance, the Registrar continues to keep a register of these societies.
- 37. Appendix "G" gives the particulars of the societies

38. A return showing the number of the various deeds registered or deposited in the Deeds Registry in 1961 appears at Appendix "H".

#### SUPREME COURT

39. The continuous annual increase of business in the Supreme Court so often commented upon in the annual report has to be recorded once again. There was an increase of 220 causes over the number filed during 1960, and when compared with 1956, the figures for 1961 show an increase of over eight hundred matters. A comparative statement showing the figures for the last 6 years is as follows:

- 40. To reduce further the arrears of matters for hearing, the Courts continued to sit long hours and it is gratifying to report that the time should not be far distant
  when the arrears will be down to a minimum.
- 41. A return of suits, appeals and other causes filed in the Supreme Court Registry in 1961 appears at Appendix "J" to this report.
- 42. A return of criminal causes instituted during the year appears at Appendix "K".
- 43. A statement of miscellaneous judicial matters is at Appendix "L".
- 44. A statement showing the matters dealt with by the Marshals of the Court appears at Appendix "M".
- 45. Representations were made to Government for the appointment of two more Marshals to meet the great inorease.

in work in that section of the office. Owing to the inability of the present marshals' staff to cope with the large number of summations for the recovery of rates and taxes for the municipalitics of Georgetown and New Amsterdam, complaints have been received from those bodies of arrears of revenue which they are unable to collect.

#### JURORS

- 46. Since my last report there has been no change in the situation to which I then adverted in regard to the remuneration of witnesses and jurors.
- 47. The law relating to jury service was amended by Ordinance No. 22 of 1961 to provide for the service of women on juries and to come into effect on the 1st January, 1962.

  Appropriate rest room and toilet facilities were furnished.

## APPLICATIONS BY POOR PERSONS

- In 1961 there were 59 aprlications by poor persons to take proceedings in the Supreme Court, 2 less than in 1960. The great majority of them were for divorce. 8 were granted, 27 refused and 24 were pending at the end of the year.
- 49. I commented in my last Report on the difficulty usually experienced in obtaining the services of solicitors willing to assist in these matters, and on the long delays which occur in the prosecution of poor person matters. The situation remains the same and will remain so until some other system of legal aid is introduced. I had suggested that we should adopt in this country the same machinery for legal aid that is provided in Britain.

## LEGAL PRACTITIONERS COMMITTEE

50. In 1961 110 complaints were filed against legal practitioners as against 108 in 1960. The committee held 46 meetings curing the year and dealt with 102 applications. This is a considerable improvement on the rate at which these matters were disposed of in 1960. The urgency with which

these complaints are dealt with is important to the legal practitioners and complainant alike.

#### FEDERAL SUPREME COURT

51. There were four sessions of the Federal Supreme Court of the West Indies held in this Colony during the year 1961. The Court sat in the exercise of its civil and criminal jurisdictions on each of those visits, in February, May, August and November.

- 52. 24 appeals were brought forward from 1960, and 72 were filed during 1961.

#### CRIMINAL JURISDICTION

- 55. There were 26 appeals brought forward from 1960, and 70 were filed during 1961.
- 56. The Court dealt with all the appeals during the year under review, and disposed of them in the manner set forth below:

## REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE

- 57. The total revenue collected by this department for 1961 was \$717,051.92, an increase of \$192,508.44 over that collected for the previous year. The main contributory factor to this increase was the duty and fees collected on transports because of the higher value of property transported.
- The increase in business in the Supreme Court Registry has been reflected in the increase of fees collected under the heads "Judicial" and "Marshals".
- 59. A comparative statement of revenue and expenditure for the years 1960 and 1961 appears at Appendix "N".

#### GENERAL

60. I referred in my last Report to plans which had been approved for the construction of a new eastern wing to the Victoria Law Courts building to provide accommodation for the Commissioner of Title and new quarters for the Depart

ment of Lands and Mines. It is not known that any progress has been made in this matter. Until this or some other alternative scheme is implemented the congestion which exists both in this Office and that of the Department of Lands and Mines will continue.

- 61. Some consideration has since been given to the possibility of renting certain premises adjacent to the Law Courts compound which were then vacant, to which the office of the Department of Lands and Mines could have been removed but that proposal was not approved by Government.
- As has been said before the separation of the Deeds and Supreme Court Registries, the need for which has already been recognised by Government, cannot take place until adequate accommodation is secured.
- 63. I adverted in my last Report to the need for creating inducements for officers in this Department to make their careers here. The resignations which have since occurred make this need more urgent than ever. The resignation of trained personnel in a Department such as this must seriously affect its efficiency.
